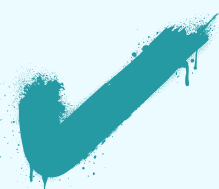

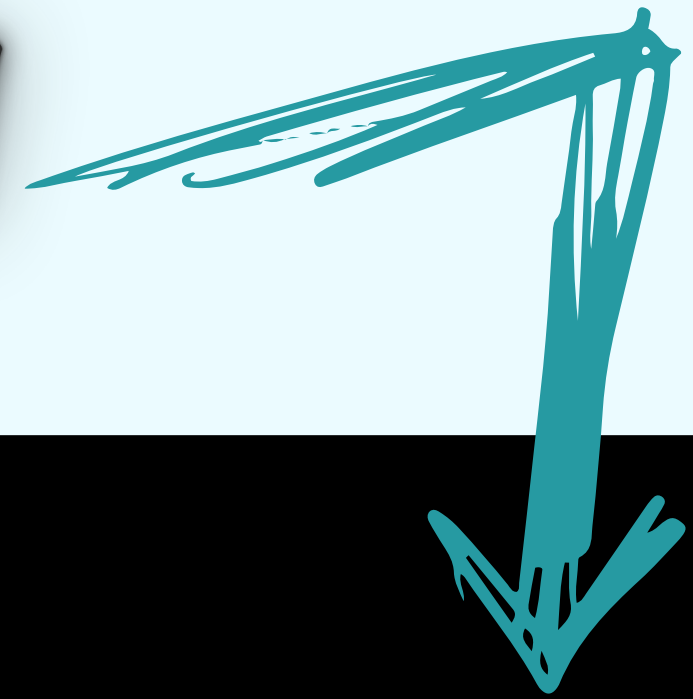

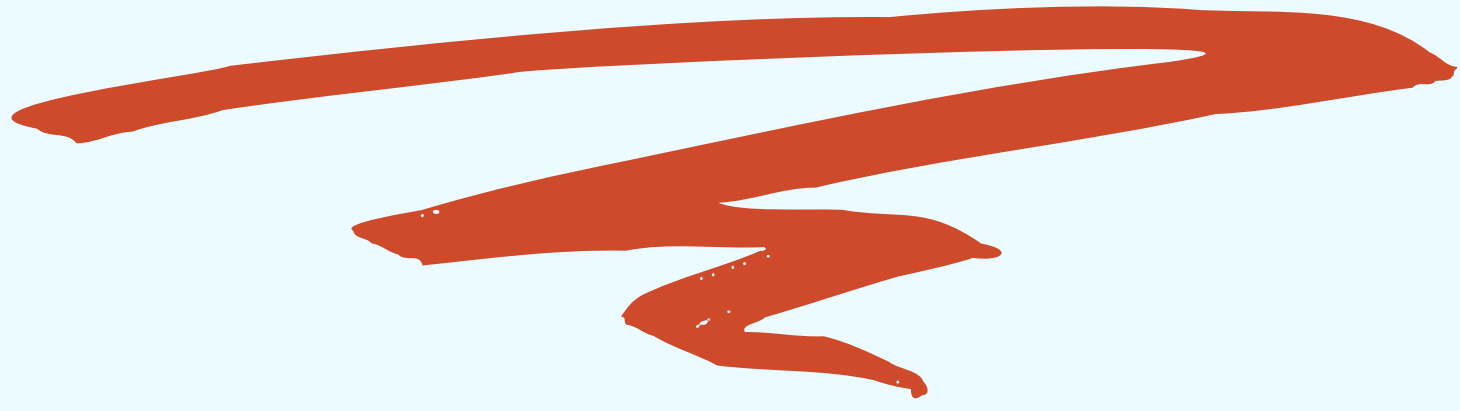

INTRODUCTION TO RAP LYRICS IN COURT

Evidence: the available body of facts or information indicating whether a belief or proposition is true or valid.

RICO Case: The Racketeer Influenced and Corrupt Organizations Act (RICO) of 1970 seeks to strengthen the legal tools in evidence gathering by establishing new penal prohibitions and providing enhanced sanctions and new remedies for dealing with the unlawful activities of those engaged in organized crime.

Indictment: a formal charge or accusation of a serious crime.

First Amendment: prohibits any law limiting freedom with respect to religion, expression, peaceful assembly, or the right of citizens to petition the government.

Self-incriminating: making a statement that accuses oneself of a criminal offense that may lead to criminal prosecution now or in the future.

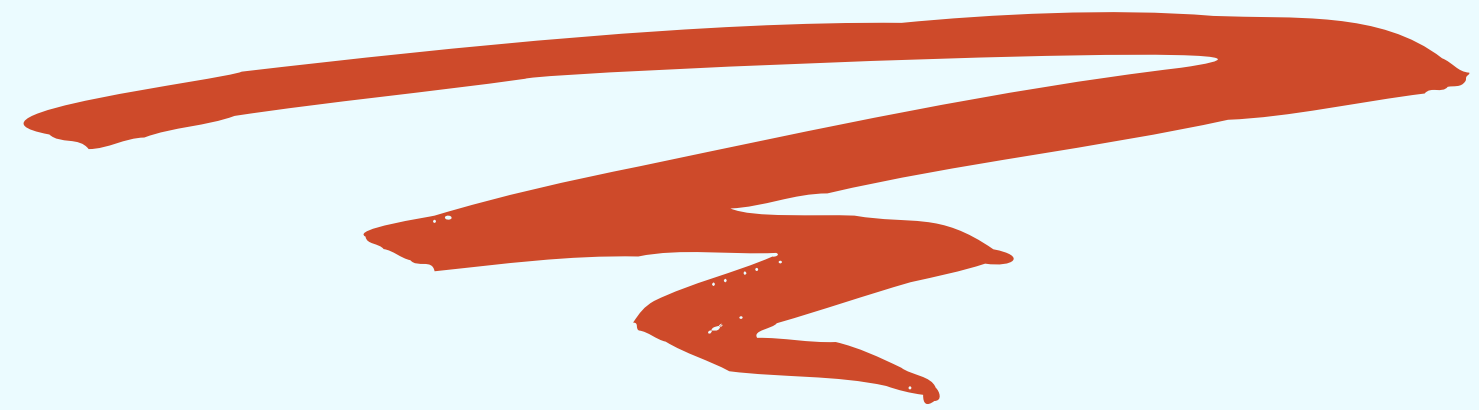

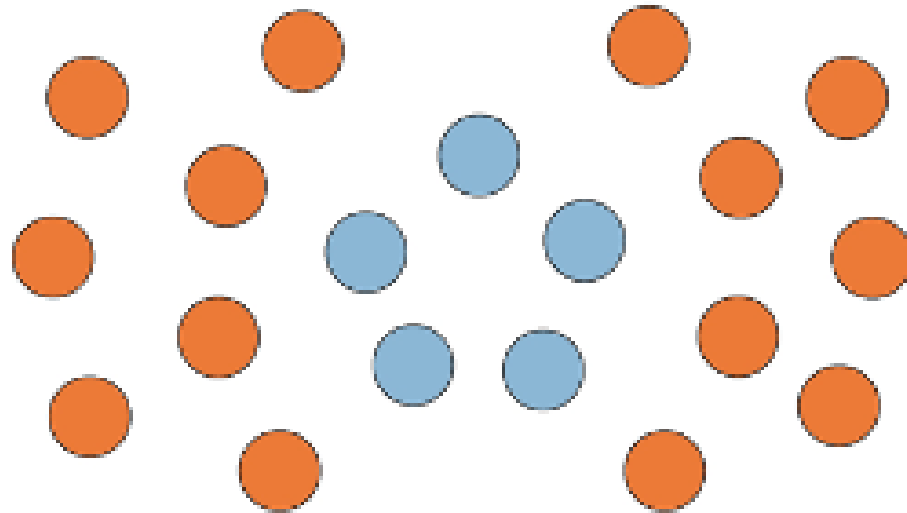

Students in the fishbowl discuss the topic or reading at hand.

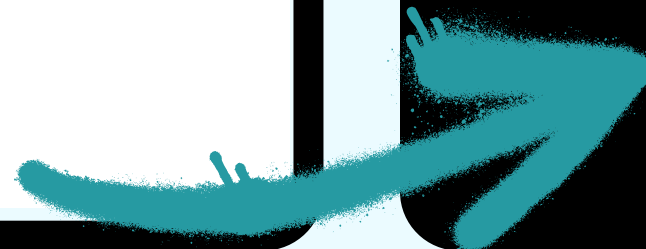


Students outside the fishbowl observe and reflect on the discussion.
